#### First Lady Jill Biden, Ed.D

First Lady of the United States

Jill Biden, Ed.D., is the First Lady of the United States, a community college educator, a military mother, a grandmother, and bestselling author. Dr. Biden also served as Second Lady of the United States from 2009–2017.

As First Lady, Dr. Biden has focused on reaching out to all Americans, helping to bring our country together.

During her first two years as First Lady, Dr. Biden traveled to over 40 states and territories, over 100 cities, and ten other countries. She has continued championing the causes that have defined her public life: supporting military families, advocating for increased educational opportunities, and working to end cancer as we know it. She advanced the missions of two key White House initiatives, Joining Forces and the Cancer Moonshot, and

also served as a leading messenger for the Administration's most urgent priorities, including: safely reopening schools after the pandemic's shutdown, supporting the President's economic agenda, and urging adults and children to protect themselves and their communities by getting vaccinated against COVID-19.

In recognition of World Cancer Day 2022, the President and First Lady reignited the Cancer Moonshot, laying out bold goals and a vision to end cancer as we know it. As First Lady, Dr. Biden has continued to work on behalf of American families confronting cancer, focusing on supporting patients and their loved ones during their cancer journeys; urging Americans to prioritize their cancer screenings; and reducing health inequities in diagnosis, treatment, research, and outcomes.

### Congresswoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz

#### **George L. Hanbury II**

President of Nova Southeastern University

Dr. George L. Hanbury II is President and Chief Executive Officer of Nova Southeastern University (NSU) in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. In addition to his duties as President and CEO, he is also a Professor for NSU's H. Wayne Huizenga College of Business and Entrepreneurship. Prior to his appointment as President, Dr. Hanbury served as NSU's Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer for 12 years. Before entering higher education administration, Dr. Hanbury led a successful 30-year career as City Manager of the cities of Fort Lauderdale, Fla.; Portsmouth and Virginia Beach, Va.; and as Assistant City Manager of Norfolk, Va.

Dr. Hanbury has been honored by many organizations, including being once again named as a 2020 South Florida Business Journal Ultimate CEO. Additional accolades include the 2019 Guy Harvey Conservation Award,

2017 Junior Achievement Business Hall of Fame Laureate, City of Ft. Lauderdale Walk of Fame inductee, 2015 Sun Sentinel Excalibur Award, 2014 South Florida Business Journal Ultimate CEO award, Fort Lauderdale's 2013 Downtowner of the Year, and many other community related awards throughout his career. He also commits much of his time to civic activities by serving on numerous boards, including the Greater Fort Lauderdale Alliance, the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy Committee, Broward Workshop Executive Committee, the Economic Council of Palm Beach County, the Business Development Board of Palm Beach County, the Miami-Dade Beacon Council, the Florida Council of 100, and the Sunshine State Conference.

# **GUEST SPEAKERS**



#### The Honorable Dennis R. McDonough

U.S. Secretary of Veterans Affairs

The Honorable Denis Richard McDonough was nominated by President Biden to lead the Department of Veterans Affairs. Mr. McDonough's nomination was confirmed by the United States Senate on February 8th, 2021, and he was sworn in the following day as the 11th Secretary of Veterans Affairs.

On January 27, 2021, during his confirmation hearing, Secretary McDonough testified to Congress, "I will work tirelessly to build and restore VA's trust as the premier agency for ensuring the well-being of America's Veterans. After all, there is no more sacred obligation nor noble undertaking than to uphold our promises to our Veterans, whether they came home decades ago or days ago."

Secretary McDonough served in the Obama Administration as the 26th White House Chief of Staff from February 2013 to January 2017. Prior to his role as Chief of Staff, Mr. McDonough was Principal Deputy National Security Advisor from October 2010 to January 2013. He also served as the Chief of Staff of the National Security Staff and as the Deputy National Security Advisor for Strategic Communications. He chaired the National Security Council's Deputies Committee, leading the multi agency team to address complex challenges including crisis management and national security policymaking. And throughout his service in the White House, Secretary McDonough helped lead the Obama-Biden administration's work on behalf of military families and Veterans.

Since his White House tenure, Secretary McDonough was Professor of the Practice of Public Policy at the Keough School of Global Affairs at the University of Notre Dame, Senior Advisor and Senior Principal at the Markle Foundation, and on the board of directors of the National Democratic Institute, the Tent Partnership for Refugees, and the SAFE Project, a national nonprofit working to end the nation's catastrophic addiction epidemic.



#### Dr. Douglas R. Lowy

Principal Deputy Director, National Cancer Institute

Douglas R. Lowy, M.D., is Chief of the Laboratory of Cellular Oncology and, since 2010, has also served as Principal Deputy Director of the National Cancer Institute (NCI). From April 2022 to October 2022, he became Acting Director of the NCI, a role he also held from April 2015 to October 2017 and between April 2019 and October 2019. Dr. Lowy received his medical degree from New York University School of Medicine in 1968, and trained in internal medicine at Stanford University and dermatology at Yale University. He has directed a research laboratory at NCI since 1975, after receiving training as a Research Associate in the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases. Dr. Lowy is a member of the NAS.

Dr. Lowy's research interests include the biology of the viruses that lead to cervical cancer, commonly known as HPV. Dr. Lowy and his colleagues studied the genetics of HPV and identified how the virus can lead to cervical and other types of cancer. Using this knowledge, Dr. Lowy and his colleagues developed the technology that is used in three FDA-approved HPV vaccines.



#### **Ambassador Nancy Brinker**

Founder of Susan G. Komen and the Promise Fund of Florida

Nancy G. Brinker is three-time Ambassador and New York Times best-selling author who is regarded as the leader of the global breast cancer movement. Her journey began with a promise to her dying sister, Susan G. Komen, that she would do everything possible to end the shame, fear and hopelessness caused by this disease. In one generation, the organization that bears Susan's name has changed the world. In 2009, President Barack Obama honored Nancy with the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor, for this work. The same year, she was named Goodwill Ambassador for Cancer Control for the United Nations' World Health Organization, where she continues her mission to put cancer prevention at the top of the world health agenda.

In 2010, Nancy released her New York Times best-selling memoir "Promise

Me", an inspirational story of her transformation from bereaved sister to the undisputed leader of the ongoing international movement to end breast cancer. From 2001-2003, Nancy served as U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of Hungary and served as U.S. Chief of Protocol from 2007-2009. In 2018, Ms. Brinker spearheaded the creation of the Promise Fund of Florida, a revolutionary fundraising initiative aimed at connecting cancer care providers with vulnerable populations. In addition to hosting an acclaimed interview series featuring newsmakers, corporate leaders and high-profile cultural thought leaders, Nancy also currently serves on numerous corporate and non-profit boards and is an Executive in Residence at the Johns Hopkins Carey Business School.



#### Martina Navratilova

Tennis Hall of Famer, Cancer Advocate

Martina Navratilova is a tennis player and now commentator, activist, parent, and fervent tweeter. During her career Martina won an unprecedented 59 Grand Slam titles, including a record 9 Wimbledon singles championships; 167 singles and 177 doubles championships. She was distinguished as the WTA's "Tour Player of the Year" seven times, named the Associated Press's "Female Athlete of the Year", declared one of the "Top Forty Athletes of All-Time" by Sports Illustrated, and inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame.

In January 2023, Navratilova announced her dual diagnosis of throat and breast cancers, marking her second and third bouts with cancer after overcoming breast cancer in 2010. She was cleared as cancer-free in March

2023, and now shares her story to advocate for the importance of early and frequent screening.

Julia Lemigova, born Yulia Andreevna Lemigova is a Russian former model who was Miss USSR 1990, and is married to Martina Navratilova. She is a cast member of the Bravo reality television series The Real Housewives of Miami.

#### Crystal S. Denlinger, MD

Chief Executive Officer, National Comprehensive Cancer Network

Crystal Denlinger is the Chief Executive Officer of the National Comprehensive Cancer Network® (NCCN®), having joined NCCN as Senior Vice President, Chief Scientific Officer in April 2021. Prior to joining NCCN, Dr. Denlinger was an Associate Professor in the Department of Hematology/Oncology at Fox Chase Cancer Center, where she served as the Chief of Gastrointestinal Medical Oncology, Deputy Director of the Early Phase Drug Development Program, and Director of the Survivorship Program. Her expertise is in clinical trials, survivorship care, and gastrointestinal malignancies. She is a practicing medical oncologist, maintaining a limited clinical practice at Fox Chase Cancer Center in Philadelphia, PA after over a decade of clinical practice prior to joining NCCN.

Dr. Denlinger is a graduate of Rutgers New Jersey Medical School and The College of New Jersey. She completed her internal medicine residency at Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York City and her fellowship in hematology/oncology at Fox Chase Cancer Center/Temple University Hospital in Philadelphia. She is board certified in Internal Medicine and Medical Oncology. Dr. Denlinger is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians (ACP) and a member of several medical societies, including the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) and the European Society of Medical Oncology (ESMO).

#### Dr. Ann H. Partridge



*Vice Chair of Medical Oncology, Dana-Farber Cancer Institute Professor of Medicine, Harvard Medical School* 

Dr. Partridge is a practicing medical oncologist and clinical researcher. She is vice chair of the Department of Medical Oncology at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, where she also serves as director of the Adult Survivorship Program and co-founder and director of the Program for Young Women with Breast Cancer. As a professor at Harvard Medical School, Dr. Partridge holds the Eric P. Winer, MD Chair in Breast Cancer Research at Dana-Farber. She leads clinical research and educational efforts nationally and internationally, and is particularly committed to improving outcomes for young women with breast cancer. Dr. Partridge serves on the Board of Directors of the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO), co-chairs the National Cancer Institute (NCI) Alliance for Clinical Trials in Oncology Breast Committee, and serves on the NCI Breast Cancer Steering Committee. She

is Chief Scientific Advisor for Susan G. Komen, and her research has been supported by the NCI, Breast Cancer Research Foundation (BCRF), Conquer Cancer, and Susan G. Komen. Dr. Partridge has received a Champions of Change award from the U.S. White House, the American Association for Clinical Research (AACR) Outstanding Investigator Award for Breast Cancer, and ASCO's Ellen L. Stovall Award for Advancement of Cancer Survivorship Care.



#### **Riki Fairley**

#### CEO and CoFounder, TOUCH, The Black Breast Cancer Alliance

As a Triple Negative Breast Cancer Survivor/Thriver, Ricki's personal purpose, passion, mission, ministry, and blessing is to bring focus, attention, research, science, and action to eradicating Black Breast Cancer, and supporting and coaching what she calls her "Breasties" through their breast cancer experience. Ricki is an award-winning seasoned marketing veteran that has transformed her strategic acumen into breast cancer advocacy. Ricki co-founded and serves as CEO of TOUCH, The Black Breast Cancer Alliance to address Black Breast Cancer as a unique and special disease state, with the overall goal of reducing the mortality rate for Black women. Ricki founded and serves as co-host for "The Doctor Is In," a weekly live breast cancer advocacy web series on the BlackDoctor.org Facebook page that reaches over 3 million viewers. She founded #BlackDataMatters to bring attention to advancing science for Black breast cancer.

In January 2022, she started the When We Tri(al) Movement to change the game on Black women participating in clinical trials to improve outcomes for Black women with breast cancer, sending over 14,000 Black women to clinical trial portals. In January 2023, she founded the For The Love of My Gurls Campaign to drive awareness and action reaching over 305,000 young Black women. Ricki is a board member for Xeris Biopharma and serves on the Board of Trustees for the Triple Negative Breast Cancer Foundation. She is a board member for the Center for Healthcare Innovation, and serves on the American Cancer Society National Breast Cancer Roundtable Steering Committee and the National Minority Quality Forum Scientific Advisory Board. Ricki has two daughters, Amanda Brown Lierman and Hayley Brown, and 3 granddaughters, Belle, Leia, and Hart, who remind her of her purpose every day. Ricki is a graduate of Dartmouth College and holds an MBA from Kellogg Graduate School of Management at Northwestern University.

#### Netta Apedoe, MPH



Deputy Director, Division of Cancer Prevention and Control Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

Netta Apedoe, MPH, is the deputy director of the Division of Cancer Prevention and Control (DCPC), the largest unit within the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion. As the deputy, she provides counsel to the division director and is responsible for the management, coordination, and oversight of the division's programs, operations, and personnel. She is a public health professional with more than 18 years of experience managing public health projects, cooperative agreements, contracts, and team building at the federal and state levels. She has served in leadership roles within DCPC for the past 13 years. Prior to joining CDC, she managed public health programs at the state, worked at various NGOs, and served as a health volunteer in the Peace Corps. Ms. Apedoe is passionate about

realizing her division's mission of "all people living free of cancer."

#### Shelley Fuld Nasso, MPP

CEO, National Coalition for Cancer Survivorship

Shelley Fuld Nasso, MPP, is CEO of the National Coalition for Cancer Survivorship, where she advocates to transform the cancer care system for everyone touched by cancer. NCCS engages in public policy efforts to improve cancer care and empowers cancer survivors and caregivers to be a voice in public policy debates. Prior to joining NCCS in 2013, she led public policy efforts at Susan G. Komen. She is a graduate of Rice University and the Harvard Kennedy School. She advocates in honor of her dear friend, Dr. Brent Whitworth, a beloved physician who died of cancer at the age of 43.



# Patrick Hwu, MD

President & CEO, Moffitt Cancer Center

Patrick Hwu, MD, is the president and CEO of Moffitt Cancer Center, one of the nation's leading cancer hospitals and the only National Cancer Institute-designated comprehensive cancer center based in Florida. As an internationally recognized tumor immunologist, Hwu has led pioneering research and clinical efforts to better understand the interactions between tumors and the immune system. He helped launch the field of gene modified T cells, publishing research on the first chimeric antigen receptor directed against cancer. His work focuses on vaccines, adoptive T-cell therapies and immune resistance. Prior to joining Moffitt, Dr. Hwu was the head of the Division of Cancer Medicine at The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center, where he held various leadership roles for 17 years.



#### Jonathan D. Licht, MD

Director, UF Health Cancer Center and Marshall E. Rinker Sr., Chair

Jonathan D. Licht, MD is a medical oncologist, scientist, and the Director of the UF Health Cancer Center, holding the Marshall E. Rinker, Sr. Chair. Dr. Licht became UFHCC director in October 2015, previously serving as Chief of Hematology/Oncology at Northwestern University at the Mount Sinai School of Medicine. His laboratory studies aberrant gene regulation as a cause of cancer and development of treatment strategies to reverse abnormal, cancer-causing gene functions. Continuously funded by the National Cancer Institute and prominent research foundations for over 30 years, he has published over 200 papers, cited over 32,000 times, largely in the field of blood cancers. Additionally, he has served as mentor to over 60 graduate students, postdoctoral fellows, and faculty members. Dr. Licht is Principal Investigator of a Leukemia and Lymphoma Society (LLS)

Specialized Center of Research. He has served on the editorial boards of Cancer Discovery, Cancer Blood Discovery, Cancer Cell, and Oncogene and is the inaugural Editor of Chef of the new journal Blood Neoplasia. Dr. Licht is chair of the Taskforce for Hematological Malignancies of The American Association for Cancer Research, and is co-chair of the Medical/Scientific Board of the LLS. In 2023 he led UF to become an NCI-designated Cancer Center in recognition of clinical and basic science research excellence, service to the community and development of programs to train research and health care professionals.



#### Stephen D. Nimer, MD

Director, Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center

Dr. Stephen D. Nimer is the Director of the National Cancer Institute-designated Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center and a Professor of Medicine, Biochemistry and Molecular Biology at the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine. He holds the Oscar de La Renta Endowed chair in Cancer Research. Previously, Dr. Nimer was at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York for nearly 20 years, where he held the Alfred P. Sloan Chair and served as Head of the Division of Hematologic Oncology, Vice Chairman for Faculty Development, and Chief of the Hematology Service.

Dr. Nimer has authored over 300 scientific publications and has received numerous awards for his research, including the prestigious Irma T. Hirschl

Career Scientist Award and the E. Donnall Thomas Award in 2015 from the Bone Marrow Foundation. He has been elected to the American Society of Clinical Investigators and the Association of American Physicians and is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians.

#### Jessica MacIntyre

Director-at-Large, Oncology Nursing Society

Jessica MacIntyre is the Director-at-Large for the Oncology Nursing Society. She received her Doctor in Nursing Practice and master's in business administration from Johns Hopkins University. She has been practicing for over 20 years in the field of oncology in various clinical and leadership positions. MacIntyre is also active within the American Cancer Society and serves on the Southeast Florida Area Board and was appointed by the Florida Nurses Association as their representative for the Florida Cancer Control Research Advisory Council. She has several publications and is an avid speaker in the areas of gastrointestinal malignancies, advanced practice, patient navigation, survivorship, and supportive care. Additionally, she is involved in research within the topics of oral treatment adherence, patient reported outcomes, cancer prevention, and survivorship clinics and their outcomes.



#### Tara Sanft, MD

Associate Professor of Medicine, Chief Patient Experience Officer, Medical Director, Survivorship Clinic, Director, Communication Skills Course, Yale School of Medicine

Tara Sanft, MD, is an Associate Professor at Yale School of Medicine, the Chief Patient Experience Officer for Smilow Cancer Hospital and Medical Director of the Adult Survivorship Program at Yale Cancer Center.

Dr. Sanft received her medical degree from Medical College of Wisconsin. She completed her residency at Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine and fellowships in medical oncology and hospice and palliative medicine at Northwestern University, where she was also a chief fellow.

Dr. Sanft cares for patients with breast cancer and conducts a long-term

breast cancer survivor clinic. In collaboration with her colleagues, she has completed several lifestyle intervention trials. Dr. Sanft currently serves as the Principal Investigator for an R01-funded study for which she investigates a healthy lifestyle intervention in women undergoing chemotherapy for breast cancer.

Dr. Sanft is Chair of the NCCN Survivorship Panel and a member of the NCCN Adolescent and Young Adult Oncology Panel. She is a member of the JNCCN Editorial Board.

### Sue Friedman, DVM



Executive Director, FORCE

Susan Friedman, DVM, was practicing small-animal veterinary medicine in South Florida when she was diagnosed with breast cancer at age 33, and afterwards learned she carried an inherited BRCA2 mutation. After treatment, she founded the nonprofit organization "Facing Our Risk of Cancer Empowered" or FORCE in 1999 to help people and families facing hereditary cancer find support and credible and relevant information and research in plain language. As Executive Director, Sue has almost 25 years of experience directing FORCE's education, research, and advocacy programs. As an advocate, Sue has a passion for facilitating informed decision-making, improving health communication between patients and their healthcare teams and increasing health literacy in society as a whole. In 2023, Sue was diagnosed with an aggressive type of thyroid cancer that was the result of the radiation she received 26 years earlier. She has

completed treatment for her latest cancer and is currently considered NED (no evidence of disease).



#### Zeina Nahleh, MD, FACP

Vice Chair for Cancer Institute, Director of Maroone Cancer Center and Chair of the Hematology-Oncology Division, Cleveland Clinic Florida

Dr. Nahleh is Vice Chair for Cancer Institute, Director of the Maroone Cancer Center and Chair of the Hematology-Oncology Division at Cleveland Clinic Florida. She subspecializes in Breast Cancer. Her research focuses on innovative treatment of breast cancer, cancer survivorship care, cancer disparity and improving the quality of life of patients with cancer. Dr. Nahleh is a member in the American Society of Clinical Oncology Advisory and Guideline committees. Dr. Nahleh has received numerous awards including the "Patient Experience Medal of Excellence" in 2022. Dr Nahleh has authored over 100 articles in the field of cancer. Dr. Nahleh has American Board certification in Oncology.



#### Dr. Arif Kamal

Chief Patient Officer, American Cancer Society

Dr. Arif Kamal serves as chief patient officer at the American Cancer Society. In this newly created role, Dr. Kamal drives coordinated efforts to accelerate progress against cancer through the organization's patient-, caregiver-, and healthcare professional-facing activities.

He leads the American Cancer Society's patient support objectives and the development of strategic plans to measurably improve the lives of people with cancer and their families. Dr. Kamal oversees the organization's cancer support, patient navigation, educational programs, patient lodging solutions, transportation services, contact center, and digital patient support offerings, as well as all aspects of organizational functions that touch cancer patients across 5,000 communities around the globe.

He is an Associate Professor of Medicine and Population Health at the Duke University School of Medicine, and recently served as physician quality and outcomes officer at the Duke Cancer Institute. He holds nationally recognized expertise in oncology quality assessment and palliative care.

In addition to clinical and academic pursuits at Duke Cancer Institute, Dr. Kamal co-founded Prepped Health, a company that develops innovative technology solutions to educate and engage patients facing a serious illness like cancer and their caregivers. He also holds several leadership positions within prestigious national professional organizations, has won numerous awards, and is a prolific author.

Dr. Kamal received his medical degree from the six-year combined BA/MD program at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, with residencies and fellowships at the Mayo Clinic and Duke University. He holds a master's degree in health science in clinical research from Duke University and a master's in business administration from the University of Massachusetts – Amherst.

Dr. Kamal lives in Chapel Hill, North Carolina, with his wife and two young children.

She is a cardiovascular researcher, specifically determining the role of the renin-angiotensin system (RAS) in the control of hypertension and other types of cardiovascular diseases. As a proponent of promoting the pharmacist's role in health care, Dr. Clark focuses her research activities on pharmacy and health-related issues for underserved and underrepresented communities.

Dr. Clark strongly believes in giving back to the community. As a founding member and faculty advisor of the Student National Pharmaceutical Association (SNPhA), she spends a great deal of time in the community providing health care services, raising funds for various causes, and mentoring students to be good community stewards. She plans, organizes, coordinates, and executes programs geared toward the improvement of health, education, and the social environment in communities. She uses SNPhA as a platform to promote pharmacy and how to treat diseases affecting underrepresented minorities. In addition, she offers her students the opportunities to develop leadership and professional skills, empowering them to create a positive image of pharmacists as healthcare providers while they educate communities on better health practices and the safe use of medications to treat diseases. As a research advisor for students, a faculty advisor for SNPhA, and Dean of the College, Dr. Clark serves as a mentor to all NSU's Barry and Judy Silverman College of Pharmacy students.



#### Usha Menon, PhD, RN, FAAN, FSBM

*Dean* & Distinguished University Professor and Senior Associate Vice President , USF Health

Usha Menon, PhD, RN, FAAN is Senior Associate Vice President at USF Health, and Dean and Professor at the University of South Florida College of Nursing. Her research focuses on culturally sensitive health promotion and illness prevention behaviors among under-represented populations focusing on cancer and diabetes with a strong emphasis on transdisciplinary implementation science. She has garnered over \$60 million in total research funding with her team.

Her leadership focus is on diversity of thought and scholarship in nursing as well as equity across faculty advancement. As dean, she is currently actively engaged in Florida in developing and implementing transformational industry and legislative partnerships in Florida to resolve the nursing and nurse faculty shortage. #### Farhad Islami, MD, PhD

Senior Scientific Director, Cancer Disparity Research, American Cancer Society

As Senior Scientific Director, Farhad Islami, MD, PhD, leads the Cancer Disparity Research team in the Surveillance & Health Equity Science department at the American Cancer Society (ACS). He primarily conducts transdisciplinary research to identify individual and structural level determinants of health and to estimate the contribution of each to disparities in cancer occurrence and leads the ACS's biennial report on the status of cancer disparities in the United States. He has also conducted extensive research on cancer surveillance and the risk factors of cancer that are potentially modifiable. His work on estimating the burden of cancer attributable to potentially preventable risk factors in the United States has been widely cited by the media, academics, and policy makers. Dr. Islami is the author or coauthor of more than 230 articles published in peer reviewed

journals, several book chapters, and the ACS's Tobacco Atlas, 5th and 6th Editions.

Dr. Islami obtained a MD degree from Tehran University of Medical Sciences, Iran, and a PhD in Epidemiology from King's College London, United Kingdom. He worked as a postdoctoral fellow and scientist at the International Agency for Research on Cancer (the cancer research agency for the World Health Organization in Lyon, France) and as a faculty member at Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai (New York) before joining the American Cancer Society in 2014. Currently, he also holds an adjunct faculty position at Rollins School of Public Health, Emory University (Atlanta).
