## Jewish American Heritage Month Toolkit for May

Jewish American Heritage Month, or JAHM, is a month to celebrate the inspiring history of Jewish people in America, educate diverse public audiences about Jewish culture, and spark crucial conversations about the American Jewish past, present and future. Highlighting these achievements and experiences helps dispel harmful prejudices against Jews and is a crucial tool in the continuous fight against antisemitism. This year's theme highlights all the vital and varied ways Jewish Americans contribute to our nation.

JAHM was first introduced as a resolution in the U.S. House of Representatives by **Debbie Wasserman Schultz** in 2005, and in the U.S. Senate by the late **Arlen Specter** in 2006. Passing unanimously, it was then established by presidential proclamation and has since been renewed every May by Presidents **George W. Bush**, **Barack Obama**, **Donald Trump**, and **Joseph Biden**.

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Rabbi Alysa Stanton broke the highest glass ceiling as the first African American female rabbi in the US. #### **Highlight Prominent Jewish Figures**

**Ruth Bader Ginsburg** – Former Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court, second woman to serve on the nation's highest court.

**Stan Lee** – American comic book writer, editor, publisher, and producer. Co-created iconic characters such as Spider-Man, the X-Men, Iron Man, Thor, the Hulk, Ant-Man, the Wasp, Black Panther, Daredevil, Doctor Strange, Scarlet Witch, and Black Widow.

**Irving Berlin** – Composer and lyricist widely considered one of the greatest songwriters in history. Composed 'God Bless America' in 1918.

Judy Blume – Best-selling author of iconic books for children and adults.

**Jack Greenberg** – Argued against segregation in *Brown v. Board of Education* as cocounsel to Thurgood Marshall and succeeded Marshall as Director-Counsel of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund

**Brad Meltzer** – Best Selling author of fiction, non-fiction, children's, advice and comic books.

Jon 'Bowzer' Bowman – Singer, member of the band Sha Na Na; game show host.

Rabbi Alysa Stanton – American Reform Rabbi, first African American female Rabbi.

**Bella Abzug** – American lawyer, U.S. Representative, social activist, and women's movement leader.

**Bob Dylan** – Jewish American singer, musician, and songwriter, widely regarded as one of the greatest and most popular in American history. Dylan was awarded the 2016 Nobel Prize in Literature for "having created new poetic expressions within the great American song tradition."

**Gloria Steinem –** Acclaimed journalist, trailblazing feminist and one of the most passionate leaders of the women's rights movement in the late 20th and early 21st centuries.

**Stephen Sondheim –** Award winning composer and lyricist credited for having "reinvented the American musical."

**Alexandra "Aly" Raisman** – Artistic gymnast and two time Olympic gold medalist for Team USA.

**Ralph Lauren** – American fashion designer, philanthropist, and businessman, best known for the Ralph Lauren Corporation.

**Ruth Handler –** American businesswoman and inventor. Best known for inventing the Barbie doll in 1959, she served as the first president of toy manufacturer Mattel, Inc.

**Letty Cottin Pogrebin** – Founding editor of Ms. magazine, writer, lecturer, social justice activist, and the author of twelve books.

**Albert Einstein** – Widely acknowledged to be one of the greatest and most influential physicists of all time, best known for developing the theory of relativity and contributions to the theory of quantum mechanics.

**Sandy Koufax** – First major league pitcher to pitch four no-hitters and chose not to pitch during a World Series game when it fell on Yom Kippur

Hank Greenberg – The first Jewish inductee in the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1954

Florence Prag Kahn – The first Jewish woman member of Congress

**Levi Strauss** – Invented blue jeans in the late 1800s, and they remain a durable, fashionable clothing staple today.

**Judith Resnick** – Electrical, software and biomedical engineer and pilot. She was the fourth woman, second American woman, and first Jewish woman to fly in space.

### **Celebrate JAHM in Your Community**

- Share the many resources and events available from more than 100 cultural organizations located in your districts and around the country, listed at <u>JewishAmericanHeritage.org</u>.
- Honor your community's Jewish history by recognizing local landmarks or contributions by community members.
- Promote institutions dedicated to Jewish history and culture in your local press or social media, such as Jewish-themed bookstores, museums, and archives.
- Write an op-ed about the importance of American Jewish contributions in history and to your community.
- Host a roundtable discussion at a local college or university with notable African American and Jewish historians to discuss the connection with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and Jewish scholars fleeing Nazi Germany in WWII. See historical <u>background on that here</u>.
- Host a roundtable on combatting antisemitism with local multicultural leaders in your community.
- Encourage your local library to create a display about Jewish life in your area.
